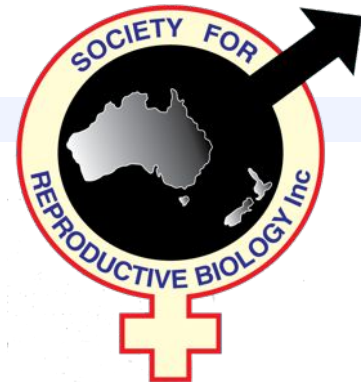

Message from the President

Recently emerging from the trials of NHMRC and ARC Grant-writing, I have had time to reflect on the challenges currently facing scientific research and Reproductive Biology, in particular. It is tempting to wallow in sombre mood in the face of the ongoing challenges of global financial uncertainty, political paralysis and a productive research community nonetheless facing limiting funding and static Grant success rates. At this time, it is especially important that more senior scientists be mindful of our younger researchers, who are particularly vulnerable and no doubt feel the uncertainty more acutely. Young researchers, our students and postdoctoral scientists, are the future and they need our encouragement, sage advice and practical support, now as much as ever.

On a more upbeat note, there are many good things to dwell upon too. Society Membership numbers continue to rise, bolstered by a record number of student members. The McKeon Review of medical research in Australia is now underway, and promises to provide a real opportunity to expand and improve research funding. The SRB has put in its

submission, and I hope that all members have been able to take the time to seriously consider the implications and opportunities presented by this review. The Society has just signed a new agreement with *Reproduction, Fertility and Development* to strengthen our historically close relationship, and secure sponsorship of the prestige lectures of our Annual Conference for a further three years. As noted elsewhere in this Newsletter, the joint SRB Annual Meeting – World Congress of Reproductive Biology in Cairns was a scientific and financial success, thereby securing the future of the WCRB, which was by no means certain. The Congress was particularly notable for exceptional interaction with our regional colleagues from sister Societies in Japan, China and Korea, who strongly supported the Congress by attending and contributing to the program in large numbers. All credit goes to Darryl Russell and his International Program and Local Organising Committees for carrying-off this difficult feat. The WCRB now proceeds in 2014 to Edinburgh, which is a bit more sub-tropical than the last two Congress sites, but should be the venue for a great meeting given the venerable



scientific history of the city of Edinburgh together with that legendary Scottish hospitality.

The SRB Annual Meeting itself was also a huge success. Once again, we must thank Eileen McLaughlin and Charles Allan for taking on double duty as both Program Committee Chairs and *de facto* Local Organising Committee Chairs. In spite of the truncated program, it was very pleasing that we had an exceptionally strong turnout from members, who were treated to an excellent scientific feast of Symposia, free communications and outstanding Plenaries from Chris O'Neill (Founders Lecture) and Ray Rodgers (President's Lecture).

Finally, we are looking forward to meeting this year once again with our sister society, the ESA, on the Gold-Coast in August. An exciting scientific and social program is already under development, so start planning those abstracts and dust off your jellyfish-resistant bodysuits and sunscreen.

Treasurer's Report Rick Nicholson

On behalf of the SRB Council, I am very pleased to once again inform the membership that the SRB remains in good financial shape. Despite the World Financial Crisis worries of the past few years, the SRB has maintained its net financial worth at over \$290,000 at the start of 2012. When we are repaid the seed funding for World Congress on Reproductive Biology this balance will be \$310,000.

The SRB continues to support the student members with generous travel grants to cover return airfares for interstate attendance. In 2011 for the SRB/WCRB meetings we had a record 63 applicants of whom 60 were in Cairns to give their presentations and receive their cheques and, thus, we invested \$29,160 on student travel awards.

This year the SRB has contributed \$4000 in seed funding as a member society for the Australian Health & Medical Research Congress (November 2012, Adelaide). It is very important that the SRB membership support and participate in such meetings, as that will maximise our financial returns when the seeds are repaid.

Thanks also to Mike Pickford, Jim Fawcett, Sam Barker and the rest of the ASN staff for the support provided throughout the process of program organisation.

In 2011, the conference program started on Friday evening with a Welcome reception after the ANZPRA workshop and ended at 5 pm on Sunday prior to WCRB welcome reception - allowing the normal SRB plenary and award sessions - but a smaller number of submissions to be presented as free oral presentations than usual as 10 minute talk + 5 minute questions format.

The WCRB hosted two joint poster sessions of approx 150 minutes each on Monday and Tuesday evening.

Abstracts: A total of 138 abstracts were submitted for consideration for SRB oral presentation and 60 accepted for presentation and the remainder offered a poster presentation in WCRB - a further approx 100 SRB members submitted abstracts as poster presentations only to the joint sessions in WCRB. This continues the trend towards increasing participation when compared to 133 in Sydney, 119 in Adelaide 2009, 128 in Melbourne 2008, 110 in Christchurch 2007 and 106 in Gold Coast 2006. Abstracts were published online as a downloadable pdf from the SRB website immediately before the meeting.

World Congress on Reproductive Biology Cairns, 2011

The Second World Congress on Reproductive Biology (WCRB) was held with the SRB as sponsoring Society in Cairns; October 9-12th 2011. The congress was a resounding success both scientifically and financially.

The SRB took a momentous risk in tendering to sponsor the 2nd World Congress on Reproductive Biology after the inaugural WCRB in Hawaii in 2008. Within months of making that decision the global financial crisis struck and all other contenders for this opportunity withdrew their interest. Sincere accolades must go to the successive SRB presidents Lois Salamonsen, Mike Holland and Mark Hedger who accepted the responsibility and believed that the SRB could run this meeting successfully. In particular Mark Hedger, the incumbent president during 2011, fully committed the resources of SRB to the success of the WCRB and this was a major contribution to its success. The local arrangements committee must also be sincerely thanked. These volunteers worked enthusiastically to solve the many challenges that arise when organising a unique stand alone event.

We all sincerely thank Mike Pickford and his team at ASN Events who provided expert conference secretariat support and without whom this task would have been impossible.

This event provided a unique opportunity to bring our international colleagues to our shores and make top echelon reproductive biology speakers accessible to all members of the SRB without the need for international travel. The chance to showcase the breadth and quality of research performed by the members of the SRB, and to network with national and international colleagues were also major benefits.

Demographics:

The 2nd WCRB was a truly international meeting expanding to incorporate 7 national societies as formally engaged partners. Each provided a representative to the steering and program organising committee.

The program included 7 plenary sessions featuring eminent reproductive biologists from each of the national regions represented. An additional 56 invited speakers from Australia/New Zealand and around the world presented in symposia focused on current cutting edge topics in Reproductive Biology.

Delegates and presenters came from 31 different countries. The opportunity to have the world's best reproductive biology research brought to our doorstep was not missed by SRB members and it was very pleasing to see almost 45% of registrants were from Australia and New Zealand.

Statistics:

A total of 521 registrations were received for the WCRB, a dramatic increase on the first congress and well above our initial target of 380.

477 Abstracts were submitted and peer reviewed resulting in 69 podium presentations and 315 poster presentations being awarded by the Organising committee.

In post-conference surveys a very high satisfaction was reported by the delegates, with 99% of respondents indicating that they would attend another WCRB after this one. Over 90% of respondents judged the program content and overall standard as either very good or excellent and likewise over 90% considered the venue and facilities in Cairns as very good or excellent. These responses indicate that in all aspects an enjoyable conference was almost universally experienced.

Financials:

Founder's Lecturer (Sponsored by RFD) - John Carroll

John has worked on oocyte and embryo development since taking on an undergraduate research project with Peter Kaye and Jim Cummins at the University of Queensland. He then moved to the University of Adelaide to undertake a PhD which involved a collaboration with David Whittingham in London. This led to a post-doc at the MRC Experimental Embryology Unit in London before starting a lectureship and MRC Fellowship in the Department of Physiology at UCL. His work has focussed on understanding how oocytes grow and develop the capacity to undergo fertilization and early development. More recent work has focussed on understanding the role of mitochondrial activity and dynamics, how the meiotic spindle polarizes the cortex to allow polar body extrusion and how the meiotic cell divisions are controlled. John has been a member of the SRF since 1989, was a member of Council for the Journal of Reproduction and Fertility and served as Editor-in-Chief of the society's journal, *Reproduction* from 2003-2006. John Carroll is Professor of Reproductive Physiology and Head of the Division of Biosciences at UCL London.



President's Lecturer (Sponsored by RFD) - Keith Jones

Keith Jones is Chair of Human Physiology in the School of Biomedical Sciences at the University of Newcastle, Australia. His research is focused on understanding how female meiosis is controlled. From 1994-8 he worked in London at the MRC Experimental Embryology & Teratology Unit and at UCL. More recently until 2008 he was at Institute for Cell and Molecular Biosciences at the University of Newcastle-upon Tyne, UK. In 2008 he moved to Australia, and is currently a member of the ARC's College of Experts and also a member of the Cell Growth and Division Section of the Faculty of 1000.

ANZPRA Emerging Investigator Award

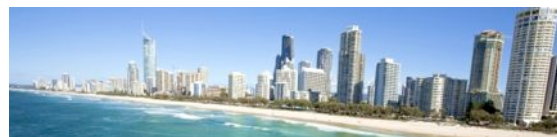
